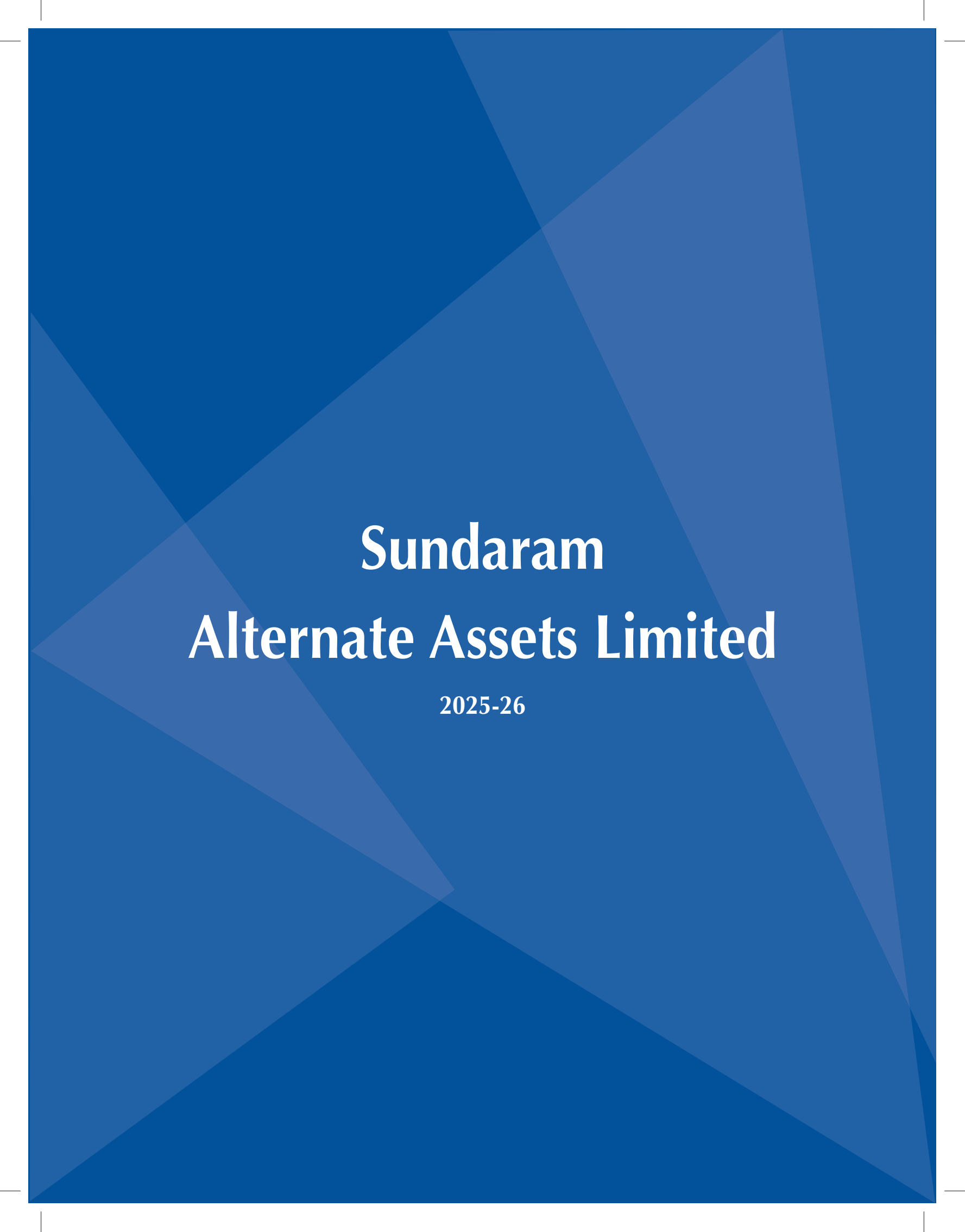

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DIRECTORS' REPORT

To the Members,

Your Directors take pleasure in presenting the 9th Annual Report together with the audited financial statement of accounts for the year ended March 31, 2026. The summarised financial results of the Company are given hereunder:

Dividend

In January 2026, the Company has declared an Interim Dividend of ₹ 1.89 per equity share (18.92%) for the financial year 2025-26 on the paid-up share capital of ₹ 39.05 crs consisting of 3,90,53,158 equity shares of ₹ 10/- each.

Your Directors are pleased to recommend a final dividend of ₹ 1.40 per share (14% on the face value of ₹ 10/- per share) for the year ended March 31, 2026, which, together with the interim dividend, would aggregate to a total dividend of ₹ 3.29/- per share (32.9 % on the face value of ₹10/-), representing a dividend pay-out of 50%.

Industry

The total AUM of the portfolio management industry under discretionary and advisory services (DPMS, where SA operates) was ~₹ 8 lakh crores as of March 31, 2026.

Under Category III AIF, as against commitments of ~₹3 lakh crores, ~₹2 lakh crores was deployed as of December 31, 2025.

The AIF Category II segment in India is the largest segment of the Indian alternates market, with cumulative commitments raised of ~₹ 12 lakh crores as of December 31, 2025. AIF Cat II is also the largest component the Company's AUM as of date.

Your Company sees tremendous growth prospects in its target segments of private credit, bespoke equity PMS and hybrid fund strategies.

Company Performance

PMS

The Company manages assets under both Equity PMS as well as Debt PMS programs.

The average assets under discretionary Equity PMS and Equity Advisory segments increased by ~13% from ₹ 2,956 crores to ₹ 3,326 crores for the financial year 2025-26. Redemptions fell sharply from 28% in FY25 to 16% in FY26 reflecting excellent performance of various SA Equity PMS funds through the year.

The SA Debt PMS vehicles manage ~₹ 469 crores of AUM as of year-end. The various Debt PMS strategies significantly beat benchmarks through the fiscal year.

AIF

As of March 31, 2026, the Company manages 4 Category III and 5 Category II AIF funds with aggregate assets under management of ₹ 5,275 crs (previous year: ₹ 3,284 crs as of March 31, 2025).

There were notable events during fiscal 2026 as follows:

- During the year, SA launched its Real Estate Credit Fund V, which raised commitments of over ~₹ 2,000 crs which is the largest single-fund raise in the Company's history till date. This fund remains open to investors for subscription and is expected to close during the first quarter of the FY 26-27.
- The Company successfully raised over ~₹ 1,000 crores in its second corporate credit strategy called Performing Credit Opportunities Fund – Series I. This fund remains open to investors for subscription and is also expected to close during the first quarter of the FY26-27.
- On the capital distribution side, SA's Real Estate Credit Fund II returned a 100% of capital and created a fund multiple of invested capital (MOIC) of ~1.56x to date from a senior secured, cash generating portfolio. The Company earned a performance fee of ~₹ 7.8 crores for delivering substantial IRRs beyond the fund's hurdle rate. This is noteworthy particularly since this fund was raised and invested through the Covid period.

- Similarly, on the equity side, Sundaram India Premier Fund, a close-ended consumption fund, matured, and distributed over ₹ 240 crores to investors in June 2025. The Company earned performance fees of ₹ 2.46 crores from the said fund that helped net profits.
- From a new launch perspective, your Company launched its first ever crossover fund strategy that is a combination of private credit and multi-cap listed equities called Sundaram Alternates – AlphaBet Fund I, an AIF Cat III close ended hybrid fund in March 2026. This is also India's first hybrid fund that combines listed equities and private credit, both running as twin alpha engines designed to create substantially better risk-adjusted returns for investors, especially considering current volatility and uncertainties in both the global and local markets.

Within each of its strategies, the private credit funds have generated attractive risk-adjusted returns for investors with a high degree of cash yield every quarter ranging between ~3-4% per quarter.

SA's Debt PMS strategies have consistently outperformed benchmarks and created a strong traction with investors and distributors in the marketplace. The Debt PMS platform also acts an effective entry point into larger investors, particularly institutional and enables cross-sell of other alternates products to this client segment.

Investors and Distributors

Your Company has ~2,450 investors under its PMS business and ~3,000 investors under its AIF platform as of March 31, 2026. The Company's private credit track record has ensured that there is a substantial proportion of repeat investors in the funds who continue to appreciate the consistency of performance.

The Company has around 800 empanelled distributors. The Company supports its investors and distributors across 6 locations.

Regulations

SEBI

During FY 2025, Securities and Exchange Board of India inter alia made the following material changes under SEBI AIF Regulations:

- Allowing Category II AIFs to invest in listed debt securities (including securitised debt instruments) which are rated 'A' or below by a credit rating agency registered with SEBI.
- Framework for Category I and Category II AIFs to make co-investment within the AIF structure.
- Allowing AIFs to launch Accredited Investors only Fund.

Some of these are relevant to your Company's operations and SA will endeavour to use these for growth going forward.

Your directors welcome the steps taken by SEBI as these measures are taken in the interest of broadening the AIF industry and providing greater transparency, accountability and investor protection.

RBI

Earlier Reserve Bank of India in December 2023 and March 2024 prescribed the regulatory guidelines in respect of investment by the regulated entities (Banks and NBFCS) in Alternative Investment Funds (AIFs).

The guidelines have been reviewed by RBI in July 2025 to take effect from 1st January 2026, considering industry feedback as well as the regulations issued by the SEBI relating to specific due diligence of investors and investments of AIFs.

The highlights of the Directions are as under:

- No Regulated Entity (RE) shall individually contribute more than 10% of an AIF Scheme's corpus
- Collective contribution by all REs in any AIF Scheme shall not be more than 20 per cent of the corpus of that scheme.
- If a RE contributes more than 5% of the corpus of an AIF Scheme, which also has downstream investment (excluding equity instruments) in a debtor company of the RE, then the RE shall be required to make 100% provision to the extent of its proportionate investment in the debtor company through the AIF Scheme, subject to a maximum of the direct loan and / or investment exposure of the RE to the debtor company.

The above impacts sponsor contribution to the Company's funds and will ensure compliance.

Macro

Global growth slowed modestly in CY2025 amid rising US trade barriers and policy uncertainty, before attention shifted to the West Asia crisis in early 2026. The ongoing conflict, particularly disruptions around the Gulf of Hormuz, has emerged as a major post-pandemic economic shock, driving higher energy prices, increased market volatility, tighter financial conditions, and weaker currencies in oil-importing nations.

Despite heightened geopolitical risks, global risk assets largely remained resilient, although recent corrections have emerged. Policymakers continue to assess the medium and long-term economic implications of the West Asia conflict.

India remained one of the world's fastest-growing major economies, with FY2026 real GDP growth estimated at 7.6%. Inflation stayed subdued, with WPI averaging 0.7% and retail inflation at 2.1%. However, elevated energy prices and sustained foreign portfolio outflows led to rupee weakness, while strong services exports and remittances helped contain the current account deficit despite muted FDI inflows.

Fiscal consolidation remained on track through the Union Budget, while the RBI supported growth with cumulative rate cuts of 125 bps and active liquidity management, maintaining a neutral stance amid evolving geopolitical developments.

For FY2026-27, India's real GDP growth is projected at 6.5–7.0%, supported by domestic consumption, public investment, and improving private capex. However, the near-term outlook remains subject to risks from the West Asia conflict, particularly its impact on energy prices, supply chains, inflation, and economic growth.

Equities

Indian equities underperformed most emerging markets during FY2026 as earnings growth slowed and valuations compressed. While headline indices delivered modest gains in INR terms, USD returns turned sharply negative. Market performance varied significantly across sectors and market capitalizations.

The year unfolded in two phases. Q1 FY2026 saw FPI inflows of \$2.6 billion, supported by RBI rate cuts and income tax relief announced in the February 2025 Union Budget, which strengthened domestic demand prospects. From Q2 onward, concerns around US tariffs and AI-driven market risks triggered capital outflows, which intensified following the US/Israel-Iran conflict in early 2026. The rupee weakened to nearly ₹93/USD, while rising geopolitical tensions also heightened inflation concerns for FY2027.

Despite market volatility, domestic economic indicators remained strong, with record automobile sales, decade-high tractor sales, a robust festive season, and strong agricultural output supporting demand. The continuing West Asia conflict is expected to keep

energy prices elevated into FY2027, posing risks to India's growth, inflation, current account deficit, currency stability, and monetary policy outlook.

Against this challenging backdrop, the Company's public equity strategies of your Company demonstrated extraordinary resilience, flagship funds massively outperforming benchmarks and achieving top-quartile rankings across strategies in both PMS & AIF Cat III funds.

Private Credit

India's private credit market remains structurally attractive, supported by a growing ~USD 4 trillion economy and sustained demand for growth capital. With an AUM of USD 25–30 billion in early 2025 (equivalent to just 0.6% of GDP and 1.2% of corporate lending), the sector has significant headroom for expansion. A supportive regulatory framework, which limits participation by banks and retail investors in higher-risk transactions, has created opportunities across real assets, SME/MSME financing, infrastructure, impact investing, and other scalable credit segments.

Industry estimates project private credit AUM to reach ~USD 60–70 billion by 2028 (i.e. a ~25–30% annual growth rate). Recent reforms, including the IBC, RERA, stronger RBI and SEBI regulations and online bond platforms that enable pricing transparency, to name a few, appear to have further strengthened investor confidence and market transparency.

SA's private credit platform focuses on wholesale lending across real estate-backed assets, mid-market corporate credit backed by strong growth, and special situations that enable pricing premiums while not participating in early stage / stressed risks, while also expanding into liquid debt capital markets through Debt PMS and bespoke treasury advisory services. The Indian private credit market recorded ~USD 12.4 billion across 166 transactions in CY2025, a 35% year-on-year increase, reflecting growing market depth and competition. Domestic managers now account for the majority of deal value and volume, highlighting the maturity of India's private credit ecosystem, where SA was an early participant.

Amid global volatility and increased investor preference for stable, yield-oriented assets, private credit continues to attract capital across institutional and HNI segments. SA's strategies focus on senior secured investments backed by hard assets and cash flows, generating asset-level returns of 15–20% and consistently delivering high-teen gross returns with no delinquencies to date. Going forward, the Company plans to expand its product suite with new funds focused on impact, sustainability, renewable energy, hybrid strategies that can create MOIC for investors, and ESG-linked credit opportunities, further strengthening its position in this rapidly growing private credit asset class.

Risk Management

Your company has a well-established Enterprise Risk Management (ERM) framework. The core of the ERM framework consists of internal risk control guidelines and policies, risk monitoring and control tools, risk reporting and exception handling mechanisms.

During the year, Management proactively assessed three significant macro and thematic risks with potential implications for our funds and strategies.

- **AI Disruption and Indian Real Estate:**

AI-driven automation has raised legitimate concerns about IT sector employment and its downstream effect on housing demand in cities like Bengaluru, Hyderabad, and Chennai. Internal analysis revealed that the risk is real but concentrated in entry-level and legacy IT roles. The Company's real estate portfolio targets mid- to senior-level professionals with four to ten years of experience, a cohort whose roles are being augmented by AI rather than displaced. Internal analysis indicates that less than 20% of the Company's real estate book carries meaningful exposure to high-automation-risk buyer profiles. GCC-led employment growth across South India provides an additional demand buffer for this category.

- **Geopolitical Risk and the Middle East Conflict:**

The Middle East conflict introduced a supply-side shock with cascading implications for India, including crude prices rising over 50%, a widening current account deficit, rupee depreciation, and upward pressure on domestic inflation and interest rates. SA does not run any direct USD exposure risks – all underlying assets are INR denominated. The Company's portfolio is well positioned to navigate these conditions. Investments forming part of corporate credit portfolio carry no direct exposure to crude derivatives or downstream commodity sectors. Investments of the Real estate funds are protected by low loan-to-value structures and brownfield project entries. Corporate credit fund exposures are backed by both assets and cashflows. The Debt PMS portfolios operate at tenors under 18 months, limiting rate sensitivity, and future private credit launches are being calibrated toward higher-yield structures to compensate for the rising rates environment.

- **Global Private Credit Stress and India's Structural Advantage:**

Global private credit, particularly in the United States, experienced stress due to AI over-exposure. Several large managers faced redemption requests they could not fully meet in early 2026, exposing the underlying issues of excessive leverage, liquidity mismatches, and heavy concentration in technology-linked leveraged buyouts. Indian private credit operates on a fundamentally

different architecture. Category II AIF regulations prohibit fund-level leverage, all structures are closed-ended eliminating redemption risk, and capital is deployed into operating businesses with tangible asset backing. These regulatory design features prevent potential sub-prime type situations though the Company constantly seeks to protect credit risks from any such market-cycle outcomes from spilling over to its portfolios.

Internal Financial Controls

The Company has well-defined and adequate internal financial controls and procedures, commensurate with the size and nature of its operations.

Board of Directors / Key Managerial Personnel

The Board of Directors of the company is vested with general power of superintendence, direction and management of the affairs. During the year ended March 31, 2026, six Board Meetings were held.

Consequent to the resignation of Mr Vikaas M Sachdeva as Managing Director in July 2025, your directors, based on the recommendation of the Nomination and Remuneration Committee, appointed Mr Karthik Athreya, a non-executive director as Managing Director for a period of 5 years from 3rd November 2025.

Your directors place on record their appreciation for the contribution made by Mr Vikaas M Sachdeva during his tenure as Managing Director of the Company.

Mr Arvind Sethi (holding DIN: 00001565) and Mr Lakshminarayanan D (holding DIN: 07988186) retire by rotation and being eligible, offer themselves for re-election. Necessary resolutions are submitted for your approval.

Mrs Bama Balakrishnan (holding DIN: 06531188) has been co-opted as Additional Directors at the Board Meeting held on 22nd January 2026. She holds office upto the date of the ensuing Annual General Meeting. Necessary resolution seeking her appointment has been submitted for your approval.

Annual Evaluation by the Board

The Board has made a formal evaluation of its own performance and that of its committees and individual directors as required under Section 134(3) (p) of the Companies Act, 2013.

Board Committees

1. Audit Committee

The Audit Committee reviewed the financial statements and the observations of the internal / external auditors along with the responses of the management.

2. Nomination and Remuneration Committee

The Committee in accordance with the mandate, formulated the criteria for determining qualifications, positive attributes of a director and recommended to the Board a policy relating to the remuneration for the directors, key managerial personnel and other employees which is available on the company's website under the following link:

The salient features of the policy are as under:

- Any person who in the opinion of the Board is not disqualified to become a Director, and in the opinion of the Board, possesses the ability, integrity and relevant expertise and experience, can be appointed as Director of the Company.
- The Managing Director is appointed by the shareholders at a general meeting.
- The Company pays remuneration by way of salary, perquisites and allowances, performance bonus to its Key Managerial Personnel based on the recommendation of Nomination and Remuneration Committee.
- The remuneration of other employees mainly consists of basic remuneration, perquisites, allowances and performance bonus. The components of the total remuneration vary for different employee grades and are governed by industry patterns, qualifications and experience of the employee, responsibilities handled by them, their individual performances, etc.

Particulars of Employee Remuneration:

Particulars of employee remuneration pursuant to Rule 5(2) of Companies (Appointment and Remuneration of Managerial Personnel) Rules, 2014, are set out in **Annexure IV** to the Directors' Report. Corporate Social Responsibility Committee (CSR)

As per the provisions of Section 135 of the Companies Act, 2013, your Company has a Policy for the implementation of the CSR framework, broadly defining the areas of spending for its promotion/development, of at least two per cent of the average net profits made during the last three immediately preceding Financial Years on the activities mentioned under Schedule VII of the Companies Act, 2013.

The CSR Committee monitors the Policy of the Company from time to time and endeavours to ensure that the requisite amount is spent on CSR activities as per the framework. A Report on CSR Activities undertaken by the Company for the Financial Year 2025-26 are set out in the prescribed format vide **Annexure I**.

The composition of the committees constituted by the Board under Companies Act, 2013 is furnished vide **Annexure II**.

Climate and ESG Initiatives

Over the past 2 years, meaningful progress has been made in integrating climate and ESG principles across the investment platform, moving from framework design to consistent execution. Climate and ESG considerations are now embedded from the earliest stages of deal evaluation through to exit particularly with respect to the Company's RE Credit funds, with material risks assessed upfront and incorporated into investment decisions. Importantly, these are not treated as advisory inputs – key ESG commitments are embedded into legal agreements through covenants and linked conditions, ensuring accountability and enforceability throughout the life of the investment.

Beyond underwriting, the approach to active ownership has been strengthened. Close engagement with portfolio companies supports the implementation of climate and ESG action plans, backed by regular monitoring, site-level engagement, and structured review processes. This enables a shift beyond compliance to driving tangible improvements in areas such as resource efficiency, governance systems, and workforce practices — enhancing asset resilience and reducing downside risk. Across over 20 million sq. ft. of green-built projects, this has translated into measurable outcomes, including ~39,300 MWh of annual energy savings, close to a million m³ of water savings, and ~15,000 tons of annual operational CO₂ emissions avoided, while also expanding access to green-certified housing in underserved markets. Climate compliance and ESG performance is tracked at both asset and portfolio levels, with outcomes disclosed to investors through annual impact reporting.

At a strategic level, the Climate Transition and ESG approach continues to be guided by a robust materiality framework, with a clear focus on climate risk, resource efficiency, workforce welfare, and governance standards. Over the year, the framework has been further strengthened through becoming a signatory to the UN Principles for Responsible Investment (UN PRI), while referencing global standards such as GRI, SASB, TCFD, IFC Performance Standards, and the UN Sustainable Development Goals to inform measurement and disclosure. These developments reflect a broader philosophy that climate and ESG are not a parallel agenda, but integral to risk management, capital protection, and long-term value creation.

Disclosure under the Prevention of Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace Act, 2013

The Company has in place an Anti-Sexual Harassment Policy in line with the requirements of The Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace (Prevention, Prohibition & Redressal) Act, 2013. Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) has been set up to redress complaints received regarding sexual harassment. All employees (permanent, contractual, temporary, trainees) are covered under this policy. No complaint was received during 2025-26.

Significant and Material Orders

During the year under review, no significant and material orders were passed by the regulators, courts or tribunals against the Company, impacting its going concern status or its future operations.

Technology Absorption and Foreign Exchange Earnings and Outgo

The Company is making steady steps towards automation and AI integration into its operations across customer onboarding, stakeholder (investor, distribution partners etc) journeys through funds, investment research etc. The goal is to significantly improve operational efficiencies and reduce clerical errors through manual processes over time. SA is working with various external vendors to achieve these outcomes.

Your Company has no material activities relating to foreign exchange inflows and outflows during the year. During 2025-26, expenditure in foreign currencies amounted to ~₹ 2.8 crores. Foreign currency earnings amounted to ~₹ 1 crore.

Merger

During the year, your Company acquired Capitalgate Investment Advisors Private Limited (CGIA) for a consideration of ₹ 35 crs, from HD Ventures LLP, an entity owned by Mr Karthik Athreya, Director, at arm's length. Post acquisition, CGIA became a wholly owned subsidiary of your Company on 3rd November 2025.

Subsequently, the Regional Director, Southern Region, Chennai vide Order dated 30th March 2026 approved the Scheme of Amalgamation of CGIA with your Company. The Appointed Date for the merger is 1st January 2026. The merger is effective from 17th April 2026.

Particulars of loans, guarantee and investments pursuant to Section 186 of the Companies Act, 2013

Notes to the Accounts

Note 1. Material Accounting Policies:

1. Corporate information

Sundaram Alternate Assets Limited ("SA" or "the Company") is a public limited company incorporated in India having its registered office at No.21, Patullos Road, Chennai 600002 and is a wholly owned subsidiary of Sundaram Asset Management Company Limited (SAMC) that caters the Investment need of High Net-worth Individuals (HNIs), Sundaram Portfolio Managers (SPM) and Alternate Investment Funds (AIF) are the divisions under the SA umbrella.

1.1 Overall considerations

The financial statements have been prepared applying the material accounting policies and measurement bases explained below.

1.2 Basis of Preparation of Financial statements

The financial statements of the Company have been prepared in accordance with Indian Accounting Standards (Ind AS) as prescribed by Ministry of Corporate Affairs under Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules, 2015 and companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Amended Rules 2016.

Preparation of financial statements, in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles, requires the use of estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amount of assets and liabilities as at the Balance Sheet date, reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the period and disclosure of contingent liabilities as at that date. The estimates and assumptions used in these financial statements are based upon the management's evaluation of the relevant facts and circumstances as at the date of the financial statements.

The financial statements have been prepared under historical cost convention on accrual basis, except for certain financial assets and liabilities (as per the accounting policy stated below), which have been measured at fair value.

1.3 Property, plant and equipment

Recognition and measurement

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at cost, which includes capitalized borrowing costs, less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses, if any.

Cost of an item of property, plant and equipment comprises its purchase price, including import duties and non-refundable purchase taxes, after deducting trade discounts and rebates, any directly attributable cost of bringing the item to its working condition for its intended use and estimated costs of dismantling and removing the item and restoring the site on which it is located.

If significant parts of an item of property, plant and equipment have different useful lives, then they are accounted for as separate items (major components) of property, plant and equipment.

Any gain or loss on disposal of an item of property, plant and equipment is recognized in the Statement of Profit or Loss.

Subsequent expenditure

Subsequent expenditure is capitalized only if it is probable that the future economic benefits associated with the expenditure will flow to the Company.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated on cost of items of property, plant and equipment less their estimated residual values over their estimated useful lives using the written down value method and is recognized in the Statement of Profit and Loss. Freehold land is not depreciated. Improvements to Rented premises are depreciated using the Straight-Line Method (SLM) over the shorter of useful life of the improvement or the lease term.

Depreciation method, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at each financial year-end and adjusted if appropriate. Based on technical evaluation and consequent advice, the management believes that its estimates of useful lives as given above best represent the period over which management expects to use these assets.

Depreciation on additions (disposals) is provided on a pro-rata basis i.e. from (upto) the date on which asset is ready for use (disposed of).

Intangible assets

Initial recognition and measurement

Intangible assets acquired separately are stated at cost less accumulated amortization and any accumulated impairment losses.

Subsequent expenditure

Subsequent expenditure is capitalized only when it increases the future economic benefits embodied in the specific asset to which it relates. All other expenditure, including expenditure on internally generated goodwill and brands, is recognized in the Statement of Profit or Loss as incurred.

Amortization

Amortization is calculated to write off the cost of intangible assets less their estimated residual values over their estimated useful lives using the straight-line method and is included in depreciation and amortization in Statement of Profit and Loss.

The estimated useful lives of items of intangible assets for the current and comparative periods are as follows:

Asset Block	Management estimate of useful life
Software	3 years

Amortization method, useful lives and residual values are reviewed at the end of each financial year and adjusted if appropriate.

1.4 Impairment

At each reporting date, the Company reviews the carrying amounts of its assets (other than deferred tax assets) to determine whether there is any indication of impairment. If any such indication exists, then the asset's recoverable amount is estimated.

For impairment testing, assets are grouped together into the smallest group of assets that generates the cash inflows from continuing use that are largely independent of the cash inflows of other assets or Cash Generating Units ('CGU').

The recoverable amount of a CGU (or an individual asset) is the higher of its value in use and its fair value less costs to sell. Value in use is based on the estimated future cash flows, discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of time value of money and the risks specific to the CGU (or the asset).

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of the individual asset, the Company estimates the recoverable amount of the CGU to which the asset belongs.

An impairment loss is recognized if the carrying amount of an asset or CGU exceeds its recoverable amount.

Impairment loss in respect of assets is reversed only to the extent that the assets carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined, net of depreciation or amortization, if no impairment loss had been recognized in prior years. A reversal of impairment loss is recognized immediately in the Statement of Profit or Loss.

1.5 Financial instruments

A financial instrument is any contract that gives rise to a financial asset of one entity and a financial liability or equity instrument of another entity.

Financial assets

At initial recognition, the Company measures a financial asset at its fair value (in the case of a financial asset not recorded at fair value through profit or loss) plus transaction cost that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the financial asset. Transaction costs of financial assets carried at fair value through profit or loss are expensed in profit or loss.

Trade receivables that do not contain a significant financing component are measured at transaction price.

Subsequent measurement

Subsequent measurement depends on the entity's business model for managing the financial assets and the contractual terms of the cash flow.

Based on the above criteria, the Company classifies its financial assets in the following categories:

- Financial assets measured at amortized cost
 - Financial assets measured at fair value through OCI (FVTOCI)
 - Financial assets measured at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL)
- i. Financial assets measured at amortized cost
- A financial asset is measured at the amortized cost if both the following conditions are met:
- a) The Company's business model objective for managing the financial asset is to hold financial assets in order to collect contractual cash flows, and
 - b) The contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.
- ii. Financial assets measured at FVTOCI
- A financial asset is measured at FVTOCI if both of the following conditions are met:
- a) The Company's business model objective for managing the financial asset is achieved both by collecting contractual cash flows and selling the financial assets, and
 - b) The contractual terms of the financial asset give rise on specified dates to cash flows that are solely payments of principal and interest on the principal amount outstanding.

Financial assets measured at FVTPL

A financial asset is measured at FVTPL unless it is measured at amortized cost or at FVTOCI as explained above.

De-recognition of financial assets

A financial asset is derecognized when the Company has transferred the rights to receive cash flows from the financial asset.

Impairment of financial assets

All financial assets are reviewed for impairment at least at each reporting date to identify whether there is any evidence that a financial asset or a group of financial assets is impaired. Different criteria to determine impairment are applied for each category of financial assets.

For trade receivables, the Company applies the approach permitted by Ind AS 109 Financial Instruments, which requires expected credit losses to be recognized from initial recognition of the receivables.

Expected Credit Loss

ECL is the difference between all contractual cash flows that are due to the Company in accordance with the contract and all the cash flows that the entity expects to receive (i.e., all cash

shortfalls), discounted at the original effective interest rate.

Based on the past experience, the company has not considered ECL impairment loss, as the receivables are from related parties and the company does not foresee any credit loss in future as well.

Financial Liabilities

Initial Recognition, subsequent measurement and de-recognition of financial liabilities

Initial Recognition

At initial recognition, the Company measures a financial liability at its fair value (in the case of a financial liability not recorded at fair value through profit or loss) plus transaction cost that are directly attributable to the acquisition of the financial liability. Transaction costs of financial liability carried at fair value through profit or loss are expensed in profit or loss.

Subsequent measurement

Financial liabilities are measured subsequently at amortized cost

De-recognition

A financial liability is de-recognized when the obligation under the liability is discharged or cancelled or has expired.

1.6 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible into cash with original maturities of three months or less. Cash and cash equivalents consist primarily of cash and deposits with banks.

1.7 Revenue

Revenue is recognized when control of the goods or services are transferred to the customer at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the Company is entitled in exchange for those goods or services, regardless of when the payment is being made. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable, taking into account contractually defined terms of payment.

Revenue from Services:

Portfolio Management, Alternate investment fund and Advisory Services:

The Company provides portfolio management services, Alternate investment fund and advisory services to its clients wherein a separate agreement is entered into with each client. The Company earns management fees which is generally charged as a percent of the Assets Under Management (AUM) and is recognized on accrual basis.

The Company, in certain instances also has a right to charge performance fee to the clients if the portfolio achieves a particular level of performance as mentioned in the agreement with the client.

Other income:

Income from interest on deposits and interest-bearing securities is recognized on a time proportion basis taking into account the amount outstanding and the effective interest rates.

Dividends are recognized in the Statement of Profit or Loss only when the right to receive the payment is established.

1.8 Employee benefits

Short-term employee benefits

Short-term employee benefit obligations are measured on an undiscounted basis and are expensed as the related service is provided. A liability is recognized for the amount expected to be paid e.g., under short-term cash bonus, if the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation to pay this amount as a result of past service provided by the employee, and the amount of obligation can be estimated reliably.

Defined contribution plans

A defined contribution plan is a post-employment benefit plan under which an entity pays fixed contributions into a separate entity and will have no legal or constructive obligation to pay further amounts. The Company makes specified monthly

contributions towards Government administered provident fund scheme. Obligations for contributions to defined contribution plans are recognized as an employee benefit expense in the Statement of Profit or Loss in the periods during which the related services are rendered by employees. Prepaid contributions are recognized as an asset to the extent that a cash refund or a reduction in future payments is available.

Defined benefit plans

A defined benefit plan is a post-employment benefit plan other than a defined contribution plan.

For defined benefit plans in the form of gratuity fund, the cost of providing benefits is determined using the projected unit credit method, with actuarial valuations being carried out at the end of each annual reporting period. The contributions made to the fund are recognized as plan assets. The defined benefit obligation as reduced by fair value of plan assets is recognized on the Balance Sheet.

When the calculation results in a potential asset for the Company, the recognized asset is limited to the present value of economic benefits available in the form of any future refunds from the plan or reductions in future contributions to the plan ('the asset ceiling'). In order to calculate the present value of economic benefits, consideration is given to any minimum funding requirements.

Remeasurements of the net defined benefit liability, which comprise actuarial gains and losses, the return on plan assets (excluding interest) and the effect of the asset ceiling (if any, excluding interest), are recognized in OCI.

The Company determines the net interest expense (income) on the net defined benefit liability (asset) for the period by applying the discount rate used to measure the defined benefit obligation at the beginning of the annual period to the then-net defined benefit liability (asset), taking into account any changes in the net defined benefit liability (asset) during the period as a result of contributions and benefit payments. Net interest expense and other expenses related to defined benefit plans are recognized in the Statement of Profit or Loss.

When the benefits of a plan are changed or when a plan is curtailed, the resulting change in benefit that relates to past service ('past service cost' or 'past service gain') or the gain or loss on curtailment is recognized immediately in the Statement of Profit or Loss. The Company recognizes gains and losses on the settlement of a defined benefit plan when the settlement occurs.

Other long-term employee benefits

Compensated absences which are not expected to occur within twelve months after the end of the period in which the employee renders related service are recognized as a liability at the present value of the obligation as at the Balance Sheet date less fair value of the plan assets out of which the obligations are expected to be settled. The cost of providing benefits is measured on the basis of an annual independent actuarial valuation using the projected unit credit method. Remeasurements gains or losses are recognised in the Statement of Profit or Loss in the period in which they arise.

1.9 Income Taxes

Income tax comprises current and deferred tax. It is recognised in the Statement of Profit or Loss except to the extent that it relates to a business combination or to an item recognised directly in equity or in other comprehensive income.

Current tax

Current tax comprises the expected tax payable or receivable on the taxable income or loss for the year and any adjustment to the tax payable or receivable in respect of previous years. The amount of current tax reflects the best estimate of the tax amount expected to be paid or received after considering the uncertainty, if any, related to income taxes. It is measured using tax rates (and tax laws) enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

Current tax assets and current tax liabilities are offset only if there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognized amounts, and it is intended to realize the asset and settle the liability on a net basis or simultaneously.

Deferred tax

Deferred tax is recognized in respect of temporary differences between the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities for financial reporting purposes and the corresponding amounts used for taxation purposes. Deferred tax is also recognized in respect of carried forward tax losses and tax credits. Deferred tax assets are recognized to the extent that it is probable that future taxable profits will be available against which they can be used.

Deferred tax assets – unrecognized or recognized, are reviewed at each reporting date and are recognized/ reduced to the extent that it is probable/ no longer probable respectively that the related tax benefit will be realized.

Deferred tax is measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the period when the asset is realised or the liability is settled, based on the laws that have been enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date. The measurement of deferred tax reflects the tax consequences that would follow from the manner in which the Company expects, at the reporting date, to recover or settle the carrying amount of its assets and liabilities.

Deferred tax assets and liabilities are offset if there is a legally enforceable right to offset current tax liabilities and assets, and they relate to income taxes levied by the same tax authority on the same taxable entity, or on different tax entities, but they intend to settle current tax liabilities and assets on a net basis or their tax assets and liabilities will be realised simultaneously.

Current and deferred taxes are recognized in the Statement of Profit or Loss, except when they relate to items that are recognized in other comprehensive income or directly in equity, in which case, the current and deferred taxes are also recognized in other comprehensive income or directly in equity respectively.

1.10 Provisions, Contingent liabilities and Contingent assets

A provision is recognised if, as a result of a past event, the Company has a present legal or constructive obligation that can be estimated reliably, and it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation. The amount recognized as a provision is the best estimate of the consideration required to settle the present obligation at the balance sheet date, taking into account the risks and uncertainties surrounding the obligation.

If the effect of the time value of money is material, provisions are determined by discounting the expected future cash flows at a pre-tax rate that reflects current market assessment of the time value of money and risks specific to the liability. When discounted, the increase in provision due to the passage of time is recognized as finance cost.

Contingent liabilities are possible obligations that arise from past events and whose existence will only be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more future events not wholly within the control of the entity. Where it is not probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required, or the amount cannot be estimated reliably, the obligation is disclosed as a contingent liability, unless the probability of outflow of economic benefits is remote. Contingent assets are disclosed where an inflow of economic benefit is probable.

1.11 Segment reporting

The Company has identified Portfolio Management Services and Investment Manager to the schemes of Alternate Investments Funds as one segment.

1.12 Earnings per share

The Company presents basic and diluted earnings per share (EPS) data for its equity shares. Basic EPS is calculated by dividing the profit or loss attributable to equity shareholders of

the Company by the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding during the year. Diluted EPS is determined by adjusting the profit or loss attributable to equity shareholders and the weighted average number of equity shares outstanding for the effects of all dilutive potential equity shares.

1.13 Cash flow statement

Cash flows are reported using the indirect method, whereby net profit / (loss) before tax is adjusted for the effects of transactions of non-cash nature and any deferrals or accruals of past of future cash receipts and payments. The cash flows from operating, investing and financing activities of the Company are segregated.

1.14 Leases

The Company has applied Ind AS 116 Leases using the modified retrospective approach. At inception of a contract, the company assesses whether a contract is, or contains, a lease. A contract is, or contains, a lease if the contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset for a period of time in exchange for consideration. To assess whether a contract conveys the right to control the use of an identified asset, the company uses the definition of a lease in Ind AS 116.

As a lessee

At commencement or on modification of a contract that contains a lease component, the Company allocates the consideration in the contract to each lease component on the basis of its relative stand-alone prices.

The Company recognises a right-of-use asset and a lease liability at the lease commencement date. The right-of-use asset is initially measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability adjusted for any lease payments made at or before the commencement date, plus any initial direct costs incurred and an estimate of costs to dismantle and remove the underlying asset or to restore the underlying asset or the site on which it is located, less any lease incentives received.

The right-of-use asset is subsequently depreciated using the straight-line method from the commencement date to the end of the lease term, unless the lease transfers ownership of the underlying asset to the Company by the end of the lease term or the cost of the right-of-use asset reflects that the Company will exercise a purchase option. In that case the right-of-use asset will be depreciated over the useful life of the underlying asset, which is determined on the same basis as those of property and equipment. In addition, the right-of-use asset is periodically reduced by impairment losses, if any, and adjusted for certain remeasurements of the lease liability.

The lease liability is initially measured at the present value of the lease payments that are not paid at the commencement date, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease or, if that rate cannot be readily determined, the Company's incremental borrowing rate. The Company uses its incremental borrowing rate as the discount rate.

The lease liability is measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. It is remeasured when there is a change in future lease payments if the Company changes its assessment of whether it will exercise a purchase, extension or termination option.

When the lease liability is remeasured in this way, a corresponding adjustment is made to the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset or is recorded in the Statement of Profit or Loss if the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset has been reduced to zero.

Lease modifications

A lease modification is accounted as a separate lease if the modification increases the scope of the lease by adding the right-of-use one or more underlying assets and the consideration for the lease increases by an amount commensurate with the stand-alone price for the increase in scope and any appropriate adjustments to that stand-alone price to reflect the circumstances of the particular contract.

For a lease modification that is not a separate lease, at the effective date of the modification, the lease liability is remeasured by discounting the revised lease payments using a revised discount rate at that date. For lease modifications that decrease the scope of the lease, the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset is decreased to reflect the partial or full termination of the lease, and a gain or loss is recognised that reflects the proportionate decrease in scope. For all other lease modifications, a corresponding adjustment is made to the right-of-use asset.

1.15 Distribution Cost

Portfolio Management Services

Distribution cost for Portfolio Management Services is charged to Statement of Profit and Loss on accrual basis.

Alternate Investment Fund Services

Prior to May 1, 2023, Upfront Commission was paid to the brokers for Alternate Investment Fund was accounted as prepaid expenses and charged to statement of profit and loss account amortised over the contractual period. Trail commissions are charged to Statement of Profit and Loss on accrual basis.

Pursuant to circular issued by SEBI, in this regard, after May 1, 2023,

- In respect of CAT III Alternate Investment Fund Management services, the commission is being paid on trial basis and charged to Statement of Profit and Loss on accrual basis.
- In respect of CAT II Alternate Investment Fund Management services, upfront commission are capped to 1/3rd of the total distribution cost. The upfront commission paid is accounted as prepaid expenses and amortised on the contractual period. Trail commissions are charged to Statement of Profit and Loss on accrual basis.

1.16 Foreign currency transactions

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into the respective functional currencies of the Company at the exchange rates at the dates of the transactions or an average rate if the average rate approximates the actual rate at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into the functional currency at the exchange rate at the reporting date. Non-monetary assets and liabilities that are measured at fair value in a foreign currency are translated into the functional currency at the exchange rate when the fair value was determined. Non-monetary assets and liabilities that are measured based on historical cost in a foreign currency are translated at the exchange rate at the date of the transaction. Exchange differences are recognized in profit or loss account.

1.17 Borrowing cost

Borrowing costs are interest and other costs (including exchange differences relating to foreign currency borrowings to the extent that they are regarded as an adjustment to interest costs) incurred in connection with the borrowing of fund. Borrowing costs directly attributable to acquisition or construction of an asset which necessarily take a substantial period to get ready for their intended use are capitalized as part of the cost of that asset. Other borrowing costs are recognized as an expense in the period in which they are incurred.

1.18 Recent accounting pronouncements

Ministry of Corporate Affairs ("MCA") notifies new standards or amendments to the existing standards under Companies (Indian Accounting Standards) Rules as issued from time to time. For the year ended March 31, 2026, MCA has not notified any new standards or amendments to the existing standards applicable to the Company.

C. Financial risk management

"The Company's Board of Directors has overall responsibility for the establishment and oversight of the Company's risk management framework. The Company's business activities are exposed to a variety of financial risks, namely liquidity risk, credit risk. Risk management policies have been established to identify and analyse the risks faced by the Company, to set and monitor appropriate risk limits and controls, periodically review and reflect the changes in the policy accordingly.

The Company's Audit Committee oversees how management monitors compliance with the risk management policies and procedures, and reviews the adequacy of the risk management framework in relation to the risks faced by the Company. The Audit Committee is assisted in its oversight role by internal audit. Internal audit undertakes review of risk management controls and procedures and the results of the same are reported to the Audit Committee."

I. Credit Risk:

Credit risk is the risk of financial loss to the Company if a customer or counterparty to a financial instruments fails to meet its contractual obligations, and arises principally from the Company's receivables from customers and cash and cash equivalents. The carrying amounts of financial assets represent the maximum credit risk exposure. Credit risk encompasses both the direct risk of default and the risk of deterioration of credit worthiness as well as concentration risk.

a) Loans and Advances

This consists of deposits and advances given to employees. The Company also does not expect any losses on the employee advances since they are given only to permanent employees of the Company.

b) Trade Receivables

The Company's exposure to credit risk is influenced mainly by the individual characteristics of each customer. However, management also considers the factors that may influence the credit risk of its customer base, including the default risk of the industry.

The Company establishes an allowance for impairment that represents its expected credit losses in respect of trade and other receivables. The management uses a simplified approach for the purpose of computation of expected credit losses for trade receivables and an impairment analysis is performed at each reporting date.

The Company periodically assesses the credit quality of the counterparties by taking into account their financial position, past experience, ageing of accounts receivables and any other factor determined by individual characteristic of the counterparty.

The Company's customer base comprises of various individuals, Alternative Investment funds and corporates having sound financial condition. An impairment analysis is performed at each reporting date for invoice wise receivables balances.

c) Cash and cash equivalents and deposits with banks

Cash and cash equivalents of the Company are held with banks which have high credit rating. The Company considers that the cash and cash equivalents have low credit risk based on the external credit rating of the counterparties.

III. Market Risk:

Market risk is the risk of changes in market prices due to foreign exchange rates, interest rates which will affect the Company's income or the value of its financial instruments. The objective of market risk management is to manage and control market risk exposures within acceptable parameters, while optimising the return.

(i) Currency Risk:

The functional currency of the Company is INR. The Company has transactions in foreign currency for software license purchases and consultancy charges, which are denominated in USD.
